"We suppose that the inventor intended to use it for the purpose of committing suicide." A scholar of the Civil War and 19th-century technology, John Lamb gives us the full story of the so-called Winans Steam Gun, from its inception to its test firings, and the story of Ross Winans, the colorful, pro-South Baltimore industrialist to whom the gun was mistakenly attributed, and who was seized and briefly imprisoned after its capture. 86.
